Housing

- 1. Slumlords are a problem.
 - a. Apartments in shambles.
 - b. Not putting money into apartments/housing.
 - c. Always looking for reasons to evict.
- 2. Homeless Homeless Vets
 - a. Need secure and clean homes.
 - b. We need several Loaves and Fishes in Arden-Arcade.
- 3. Problems in Accessibility
 - a. No elevators in Butano Apartments (three-story high apartments).
 - b. Multi-flight stairs for those who have physical limitations.
- 4. Huge disparity in income levels within short distances of each other.
- 5. Resources for homeless
 - a. Need resources to help them find housing.
 - b. Get resources to people in need.
 - c. Need navigators for Arden-Arcade (note: navigators are used in South Sacramento and in the City to help people get the resources they need.) Someone who can walk the homeless through the program.
- 6. Existing homeless programs
 - a. Have requirements (obstacles)
- 7. Arden-Arcade one of the most affordable areas that are left. Many vulnerable people on fixed incomes.
- 8. Obstacles to getting housing finance
 - a. Credit checks
 - b. Down Payment
- 9. Assisting the Homeless
 - a. County once in a lifetime thing.
 - b. Buffalo, NY pay people to provide shelters.
- 10. There are a lot of vacant large buildings in Arden-Arcade have homeless fix these buildings to make them habitable create sense of ownership.

- 11.Existing program Winter Sanctuary
 - a. Bus homeless in to local churches, bus them out in the morning.
 - b. Need more churches to participate.
 - c. This is a band aid only.
- 12." If I am a victim of my landlord, I do not know who to call".
 - a. Rental Helpline operated by Sacramento Self-Help Housing
- 13.Mather and McClellan are big enough for another Loaves and Fishes.
 - a. There are limited vacant lots in Arden-Arcade.

Civil Engagement

- 1. This requires dedicating time volunteering give some of your time.
- 2. Board of Supervisors
 - a. Cannot depend on them.
 - b. We need to talk among ourselves.
- 3. Techniques
 - a. Find out who the chiefs are. The chiefs will bring the people.
 - b. Reach people where they are. Example: set up a booth outside of Safeway.
 - c. Other communities have united under a single issue.
 - d. Use billboards (or message boards).
 - e. Use technology geotagging.
- 4. Groups to contact
 - a. Find who the community groups are.
 - b. Contact the churches.
- 5. Contact the churches.
- 6. Developing trust relationships
 - a. Until they know that you care, they will not let you know what their concerns area.
 - b. It is about being consistent requires some nurturing and tilling.
- 7. People are not as rooted here like in other areas (such as Del Paso Heights). A lot of college students.
 - a. We need events to help people engage with each other.
- 8. Identity what is the identity of this community?
 - a. Embrace the history of Arden-Arcade.

Potential Solutions to Identified Issues

- 1. Charging stations for cell phones at light rail to increase public safety.
- 2. Home ownership assistance programs and incentives.
 - a. To increase community pride.
 - b. Reduce home destruction, crime.
 - c. Inform public of high risk loans.
 - d. Promote civic engagement (more invested in community).
- 3. Access to public facilities
 - a. Increase access to facilities for children/teens.
 - b. Deters child and youth delinquency.
 - c. Repurpose old vacant buildings for youth engagement.
- 4. Crime Prevention
 - a. More community centers.
 - b. Incentives for Apple and other computer companies to assist with money (for computer equipment – job training and development).

Proposals

- 1. K-12 curriculum to teach urban planning and development.
- 2. Sacramento County Community Centers to promote youth activities and decrease crime.
- 3. Incentive programs for homeowners.
- 4. Land development waivers for disadvantaged neighborhoods.
- 5. Rotate farmers markets and educate families on how to prepare healthy foods.

6. Increase density in single family homes to address displacement.

Other Comments (Not Captured by Facilitator Notes)

- 1. Homeless situation use big box buildings for triage center for homeless.
- 2. Blocks that are dark use lights with trigger system.
- 3. Expand RT micro transit system.
- 4. Homeownership a lot of people in disadvantaged communities do not think that homeownership is possible.
 - a. Develop a training program to help people buy a home that it is possible to own a house.
- 5. Need for inclusionary housing small subdivision has 10 homes, two has to be used for affordable housing.
- 6. SHRA has a homeownership program but nobody knows about it.
- 7. Before the recession, banks and mortgage companies were focusing on disadvantaged areas to sell bad mortgages (subprime loans).
